Adult safeguarding and support Adult Support and Protection (Scotland) Act 2007 This Act requires health boards in Scotland to report to local authorities if they know or believe that an individual is an 'adult at risk' (whether or not they lack capacity to make the decision) and action needs to be taken to protect them. The Act also requires

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Health and Social Care (Safety and Quality) Act 2015

(a) any provision made by or under the Data Protection Act 1998, or (b) a common law duty of care or confidence. (6)
This section does not require

the relevant person to do anything which the relevant person is required to do under a common law duty of care (and, accordingly, any such requirement is to be treated as arising
